#### The minister reads

#### All sit for the SECOND LESSON

A reading from the Gospel according to St John.

When Jesus then lifted up his eyes, and saw a great company come unto him, he saith unto Philip, Whence shall we buy bread, that these may eat? And this he said to prove him: for he himself knew what he would do. Philip answered him, Two hundred pennyworth of bread is not sufficient for them, that every one of them may take a little. One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, saith unto him, There is a lad here, which hath five barley loaves, and two small fishes: but what are they among so many? And Jesus said, Make the men sit down. Now there was much grass in the place. So the men sat down, in number about five thousand. And Jesus took the loaves; and when he had given thanks, he distributed to the disciples, and the disciples to them that were set down; and likewise of the fishes as much as they would. When they were filled, he said unto his disciples, Gather up the fragments that remain, that nothing be lost. Therefore they gathered them together, and filled twelve baskets with the fragments of the five barley loaves, which remained over and above unto them that had eaten. Then those men, when they had seen the miracle that Jesus did, said, This is of a truth that prophet that should come into the world. When Jesus therefore perceived that they would come and take him by force, to make him a king, he departed again into a mountain himself alone.

#### THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

Finzi was commissioned to write a Magnificat for an American University Christmas concert in 1952. Despite not being intended for liturgical use, and notwithstanding the composer's agnosticism, the work is true to the text throughout. From the triumphant repetitions of 'My soul doth magnify the Lord' through to the final lullaby-like 'Amen', Finzi brilliantly conjures the mood of this Marian prayer.

Gustav Holst's setting of the Nunc Dimittis was composed for Richard Terry, organist of Westminster Cathedral, and was first performed on Easter Sunday, 1915. Like Finzi's Magnificat, Holst manages to evoke the meaning of the words wonderfully. The opening passage is particularly beguiling, capturing a stillness and serenity befitting the text, 'Lord, now lettest though thy servant depart in peace'.

Christus Vincit was written by contemporary Scottish composer James MacMillan in 1994 for St Paul's Cathedral, London. The structure of the work is almost counterintuitive: despite the triumphant meaning of the words, the first half of the piece remains utterly contained and punctuated with periods of complete silence. Only twice during the repeated utterances of 'Christus vincit, Christus regnat, Christus imperat' is the choir allowed to reach to a loud dynamic. However, in the final 'Alleluia' section, the exultant nature of the piece is realised. The composer builds towards a musical climax, before culminating with a breath-taking soprano solo.
