The minister reads

THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

This evening's setting of the canticles was written by Victorian composer Samuel Sebastian Wesley in 1845, whilst he worked as organist at Leeds Parish Church. Wesley was a prolific composer of Anglican music, and his style had a significant effect on later choral composers. He brought new life to the texts by his use of varied musical textures – from full-bodied unison sections, to intricate passages for soloists.

For most of his life, Sir William Harris was a cathedral organist and teacher. He compositional output is small, comprising church and organ music. Like Harris' earlier work, *Faire is the heaven*, tonight's anthem, *Bring us, O Lord God,* is an expansive work for double-choir in the transcendent key of D_b major. It is a setting of John Donne's 17th century text, looking toward a heaven where there shall be 'no noise nor silence... no fears nor hopes... no ends nor beginnings, but one equal eternity'. The harmonic richness of this glorious vision and its passionate emotion is beautifully consolidated in the final D_b major chord: the final arrival at the gates of heaven.
