The minister reads

Dearly beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places, to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy.

And although we ought, at all times, humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul. Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart, and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me;

Almighty and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and we have done those things which we ought not to have done; and there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults. Restore thou them that are penitent; according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake; that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name. Amen.

The minister then says the ABSOLUTION

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness and live; and hath given power, and commandment to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent, and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Wherefore let us beseech him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him, which we do at this present; and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

A reading from the Book of Job.

THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

Tomás Luis de Victoria was one of the most important composers of the Counter-Reformation, working in Spain and Italy in the late 16th and early 17th centuries. He trained first as a choirboy in Ávila Cathedral before going to Rome in 1565 with a grant from King Philip II. Victoria was not only a composer, but also an accomplished organist and singer, as well as a Catholic priest. Tonight's anthem is Victoria's extended 8-part setting of the Ave Maria for double choir. The antiphonal writing alternates passages of homophony and polyphony as well as moving through both triple and duple metres.

Der Geist hilft unser Schwachheit auf is one of six motets reliably attributed to Johann Sebastian Bach. It was written in 1729 for the funeral of Johann Heinrich Ernesti, a Professor at Leipzig. The text combines verses from Paul's Epistle to the Romans with the final verse of a Lutheran hymn for Pentecost. Rather than writing a solemn piece for mourning, Bach conveys the descent of the Holy Spirit through the music. This is most apparent in the opening section: the scoring of the music for double choir, and the long run on the word 'Geist' evoke the chaotic glossolalia experienced by the Apostles on Pentecost, as recorded in Acts 2: 1–13.
