The minister reads

Dearly beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places, to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy.

And although we ought, at all times, humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul.

Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart, and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me;

All say, kneeling

Almighty and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and we have done those things which we ought not to have done; and there is no health in us. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders. Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults. Restore thou them that are penitent; according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake; that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name. Amen.

The minister then says the ABSOLUTION

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness and live; and hath given power, and commandment to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent, and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel.

Wherefore let us beseech him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him, which we do at this present; and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

A reading from the Gospel according to St Luke.

And he said unto them, What things? But we trusted that it had been he which should have redeemed Israel: and beside all this, today is the third day since these things were done. Yea, and certain women also of our company made us astonished, which were early at the sepulchre; And when they found not his body, they came, saying, that they had also seen a vision of angels, which said that he was alive. And certain of them which were with us went to the sepulchre, and found it even so as the women had said: but him they saw not. Then he said unto them, O fools, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken: Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, and to enter into his glory? And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, he expounded unto them in all the scriptures the things concerning himself.

And they drew nigh unto the village, whither they went: and he made as though he would have gone further. But they constrained him, saying, Abide with us: for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent. And he went in to tarry with them. THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

This evening's setting of the Magnificat and Nunc dimittis was written by Herbert Howells, who composed them for performance by the choir of Gloucester Cathedral in 1946. Howells' interest in the English choral tradition could never be said to have been limited to just one era. Surely this breadth of influence is as evident in tonight's canticles as it could be in any of his others, whether in the pseudo-monastic unison passage that begins the Magnificat, the quietly ruminative discourse of the Nunc dimittis, or in the astounding Gloria Patri that concludes each section. It is believed that this setting was the one with which the composer, a long-suffering perfectionist, was most pleased.

Sir William Henry Harris, beloved cathedral organist and teacher, established himself as a stalwart of twentieth-century English music: he held the title of Professor of Organ and Harmony at the Royal College of Music from 1921 to 1955, and became organist at St George's Chapel Windsor in 1933 a position in which he conducted the Coronation services of both 1937 and 1953. Harris' faculties as a composer were perhaps less celebrated, but his highquality Anglican services, canticles and motets - and, of course, organ music – are still loved and heard daily in this country. Harris' 1959 setting of John Donne's blissfully radiant religious poem Bring us, O Lord God is a comparatively late work. An expansive setting for double-choir in the burnished realm of D_b major, the imagery of Donne's seventeenth-century text is brought to life by Harris' rich harmonic palette, which summons glorious visions of Heaven and continuously wills the listener toward a resplendent climax. Harris reserves the most mystical music for the concluding 'Amen's and their final cadence; the dreamlike arrival at the gates of God's own dominion.
