The minister reads

Dearly beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places, to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy.

And although we ought, at all times, humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul.

Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart, and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me;

All say, kneeling

Almighty and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep.

We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts.

We have offended against thy holy laws.

We have left undone those things
which we ought to have done;
and we have done those things
which we ought not to have done;
and there is no health in us.

But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders.

Spare thou them, O God, which confess their faults.

Restore thou them that are penitent; according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesu our Lord.

And grant, O most merciful Father, for his sake;

that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name.

Amen.

The minister then says the ABSOLUTION

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness and live; and hath given power, and commandment to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent, and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel.

Wherefore let us beseech him to grant us true repentance, and his Holy Spirit, that those things may please him, which we do at this present; and that the rest of our life hereafter may be pure and holy; so that at the last we may come to his eternal joy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

Tonight's setting of the canticles by Kenneth Leighton was commissioned by the Cathedral Organists' Association in memory of Brian Runnett, the Organist and Master of the Choristers at Norwich Cathedral, who was tragically killed in a car accident on his way home from giving an organ recital at Westminster Abbey. Runnett's memory can be keenly felt in this setting, particularly in the striking independence of the organ part throughout, which provides support to the voices above it whilst retaining its own rhythmic interest.

Alma Redemptoris Mater, a hymn from the Liber Usualis and one of four seasonal liturgical Marian antiphons, exhorts the Mother of Christ to hear her people's cry and raise them from anguish. This setting, commissioned from Cecilia McDowall by the Conwy Festival in 2010 and aptly premièred by The Marian Consort, references the hexametrical structure of the hymn in its compound-duple construction. The resulting jaunty rhythms, together with a generally bright tonality (sometimes intimating the exotic Lydian mode), imbue an easiness of character and a calming simplicity. The six voices congregate at 'Gabrielis ab ore / Sumens illud Ave', momentarily revealing the setting's melodic foundation in plainsong, before a final joyful cadence.
