The minister reads

Dearly beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places, to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with an humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy.

And although we ought, at all times, humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul.

Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart, and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me;

All say, kneeling

Almighty and most merciful Father; We have erred, and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep.

We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts.

We have offended against thy holy laws.

We have left undone those things
which we ought to have done;
and we have done those things
which we ought not to have done;
and there is no health in us.

But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us, miserable offenders.

that we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name.

The minister then says the ABSOLUTION

THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

Sir Charles Villiers Stanford completed the Magnificat and Nunc dimittis in A in February of 1880, whilst he was Director of Music in this College. The work had been commissioned by John Stainer for the annual Festival of the Sons of the Clergy, and was first performed in St Paul's Cathedral by more than three hundred singers in May the same year. Stanford wrote five settings of the evening canticles, but the Service in A is unique amongst them for its original scoring for orchestra. Stanford used the same Gloria Patri for all of his services in A. It differs from the preceding music in its having been scored for double, rather than single, choir, surely promising an even grander finale for each of the pieces.

Schaffe in mir Gott is one of a set of two motets completed by Brahms in 1860. It can be separated into three movements, each of which employs a canon, showing Brahms at the height of his contrapuntal prowess. In the first section there is a canon at the octave in augmentation between the soprano and bass, so that the soprano sings the subject twice in the time that the bass sings it once. The second section uses a chromatic subject in tight *stretti*, reflecting the anguish of the text. The third section begins with a simple canon first in the male, then in the female voices, before giving way to a spirited fugue.
