#### The minister reads

# THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

Howells' evening service, composed in 1946 for the cathedral in his native Gloucester, remains one of his most popular compositions. Sophie Cleobury expounds its intelligence, saying of the setting that the reappearance and evolution of the Magnificat's opening motif lends the canticle a structural clarity that is bettered by none other. Cleobury also points to Howells' exemplary word setting, especially his unparalleled understanding of the natural rhetoric of words; it 'works' even when the composer is intent on placing syllabic emphases on weak beats of the bar. The effect is one of timelessness: metrical ambiguity as well as the intertwining of pseudo-monastic soprano lines affords the music a sense of freedom that his other popular settings cannot match. This is as much the case in the Magnificat as it is throughout the quietly ruminative discourse of the Nunc Dimittis. With very few exceptions, Howells' use of added chromatic notes other than sevenths was, before this service, almost entirely confined to his organ parts. The Gloucester service is the first in which vocal parts contain complex ninths, elevenths, and thirteenths, and the expanded range - over three and a half octaves, including the organ - suggests that more autonomy is here given to each line purely for expression's sake. According to Cleobury, the astounding Gloria Patri is especially significant: it is both a shocking juncture dramatically - several new modes are announced rapidly as the words 'as it was in the beginning' are passed from voice to voice, reaching a heady climax with the soaring sopranos – as well as confirmation that Howells was now speaking confidently in his mature musical language. It is believed that this setting was the one with which the composer, a long-suffering perfectionist, was most pleased.

William Byrd's *Sing Joyfully* is a setting of the first four verses of Psalm 81, scored for six unaccompanied voices. The piece is resolutely jubilant throughout: the opening imitative entries of 'Sing joyfully', comprising an upward leaping fifth and a syncopated, melismatic flourish, establish a buoyant mood from the outset. Byrd's evocative word-painting is exercised particularly well to describe a merry band of instruments: staccati for the plucking of a harp, drawn-out tenuti for the bow strokes of a stately viol, and fanfares for the sounding of a trumpet. The playful character, confident polyphony and triumphant climax of this piece assures it great popularity; it was Byrd's most popular anthem during his lifetime, and remains so today.
