The minister reads

NEXT SUNDAY'S PREACHER

THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

Tonight's Magnificat is one of a collection of eighteen written by Sebastián de Vivanco, a Spanish Renaissance composer who hailed from the same town (Ávila) as his renowned contemporary, Victoria. Vivanco achieved not dissimilar renown during his life, and worked as choir-master of the Cathedral and professor of music at the University in Salamanca during his last twenty years. It was during this time that the collection of Magnificats was published in 1607. The *Octavi toni* setting that the choir sings tonight incorporates alternating verses of plainsong and eight-part polyphony, with a single verse for four-part semi-chorus.

The anthem Give me the wings of faith was commissioned for the Patronal Festival of St John the Baptist, Leytonstone, in June 1962. It is a setting of Isaac Watts' 1709 poem and is scored for two soloists - soprano and baritone - choir and organ. Written in his gritty quasi-serial style, Leighton hints at the powerful effects he obtained in his impressive large-scale choral and organ works. Often Leighton's religious music offers a disconcerting view of the struggles of religion, forcing us to think again about even the most familiar scenes – Give me the wings of faith is no exception. Watts imagines the triumph of the saints above, imagining 'how great their joys, how bright their glories be'. But in Leighton's setting, the angular chromaticism and the ticking beat of the organ's minims allow little time for basking in glory. The organ shrinks down to a pianissimo, before it drops out altogether; and in a whispered hush the choir recalls that, for all their triumph now, 'Once they were mourning here below, and wet their couch with tears'. The perfect, saintly life is not devoid of restlessness; it is devoted to it. It is a road full of torments, marked out by 'Our glorious Leader' Christ himself, who offers his own example for imitation. The poem's climax imagines that saintly path to heaven; yet there is something abrupt and peremptory about Leighton's setting. After the harmonic movement - the piece has travelled through all sorts of harmonic centres, suggesting all sorts of tonalities - the piece simply lands on a fortissimo B major chord. Leighton was a composer who could chart minutely the harmonic swell and decay of a piece; the fact that he didn't here looks like another aspect to his distinctive musical theology. By the close of the piece, not one step has been taken on the 'path to heaven'; what we see attested by the 'long cloud of witnesses' is how long and arduous that path is.
