The FIRST LESSON is read

A reading from the First Book of Kings.

And Solomon made affinity with Pharaoh king of Egypt, and took Pharaoh's daughter, and brought her into the city of David, until he had made an end of building his own house, and the house of the Lord, and the wall of Jerusalem round about. Only the people sacrificed in high places, because there was no house built unto the name of the Lord, until those days. And Solomon loved the Lord, walking in the statutes of David his father: only he sacrificed and burnt incense in high places. And the king went to Gibeon to sacrifice there; for that was the great high place: a thousand burnt offerings did Solomon offer upon that altar.

In Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream by night: and God said, Ask what I shall give thee. And Solomon said, Thou hast shewed unto thy servant David my father great mercy, according as he walked before thee in truth, and in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart with thee; and thou hast kept for him this great kindness, that thou hast given him a son to sit on his throne, as it is this day. And now, O Lord my God, thou hast made thy servant king instead of David my father: and I am but a little child: I know not how to go out or come in. And thy servant is in the midst of thy people which thou hast chosen, a great people, that cannot be numbered nor counted for multitude. Give therefore thy servant an understanding heart to judge thy people, that I may discern between good and bad: for who is able to judge this thy so great a people? And the speech pleased the Lord, that Solomon had asked this thing.

And God said unto him, Because thou hast asked this thing, and hast not asked for thyself long life; neither hast asked riches for thyself, nor hast asked the life of thine enemies; but hast asked for thyself understanding to discern judgment; Behold, I have done according to thy words: lo, I have given thee a wise and an understanding heart; so that there was none like thee before thee, neither after thee shall any arise like unto thee. And I have also given thee that which thou hast not asked, both riches, and honour: so that there shall not be any among the kings like unto thee all thy days. And if thou wilt walk in my ways, to keep my statutes and my commandments, as thy father David did walk, then I will lengthen thy days. And Solomon awoke; and, behold, it was a dream. And he came to Jerusalem, and stood before the ark of the covenant of the Lord, and offered up burnt offerings, and offered peace offerings, and made a feast to all his servants.

THIS EVENING'S MUSIC

The general neglect of Stanford's music in the years after his death did not extend to his ecclesiastical works. Of the portion of his oeuvre, few pieces are as well-known today as his evening services, his Three Motets Op. 38, and his anthems. Vaughan Williams also ranked the Stabat Mater as one of Stanford's works of 'imperishable beauty'. In Music in Britain, one of the few books to deal with Stanford's music in detail, Nicholas Temperley writes that it is due to Stanford that settings of the Anglican church services regained their 'full place beside the anthem as a worthy object of artistic invention'. In his view, the service in C (1909) was, along with the services in A (1880) and F (1889), one of the most important and enduring additions from those years to the cathedral repertory. As with his concert works, the emphasis in these settings is on melodic expression. In his 2002 biography of the composer, musicologist Paul Rodmell comments that Stanford's bass lines are always supportive, and anything within the texture he describes straightforwardly as 'filling'.

John Ireland's anthem Greater love hath no man was commissioned for the sub-organist of St Paul's Cathedral, Charles Macpherson. Its text draws from a compilation of Biblical passages in Daily Light on the Daily Path, a series of booklets with devotional scripture readings organised by Biblical theme. The overarching theme of Greater love is that of selfsacrifice for a greater-good, and with the outbreak of war in 1914, the anthem began to resonate with a nation that was mourning the tragic loss of life on the Western Front. Jeremy Dibble has observed that Ireland's anthem 'has the scope and narrative redolent of a small cantata in its manner of continuity and 'dialogue' between soloists and chorus'. In fact, the solo passages for soprano and baritone ('that we, being dead to sins') are followed by increasingly emotive restatements in the full choir of the same text and point towards a ubiquitous device used by Ireland throughout the anthem, that of call and response and mounting repetition. The opening bars contain a statement in the tenor part which is echoed by the unison choir and quickly developed with harmony and imitative writing, and the final paragraph begins with an alto and tenor unison ('I beseech you brethren') before expanding to as much as a seven-note chord. Even the organ part is susceptible to the surges of repetition, engaging in call and response with the choir at 'Ye are washed'. These devices imbue Greater love with a sense of fellowship, comradery and communal devotion which, as the death-toll rose across the Western Front, spoke to those seeking sanctuary in cathedrals and churches across England.
